Bond projects update

Maples will return to a new and improved Adrian Public Schools this fall!

Major projects were underway this summer, including the new Outdoor Education Center Dedicated to Joe Pullen and the upgraded pool at Adrian High School. Hats off to the Class of 2017!

In June, 224 Adrian High School and McKinley Education Center students received their diplomas, all embarking on unique paths toward college and successful careers.



A total of 189 students graduated from Adrian High School on June 4 at Maple Stadium, many with top recognitions for their academic achievement and leadership.

The AHS Class of 2017 was led by valedictorians **Tanner Gritzmaker**, **Michael Petterson**, **Greeshma Pandya** and **Caila Coyne**, and salutatorian **Maggie Roback**.

The AHS graduating class included 51 honor graduates: 14 cum laude, 12 magna cum laude and 25 summa cum laude. Twelve graduates received International Baccalaureate diplomas. Leading up to graduation, 43 graduates were awarded scholarships totaling more than \$50,000.

n June 6, 35 McKinley Education

Center adult and alternative education students, many earning academic accolades and college scholarships, graduated at the Adrian Performing Arts Center.

McKinley's alternative high school program serves students ages 17-19 through traditional and online courses and technical training programs. The school's adult education program allows students age 20 and older to earn their high school diploma or prepare for the GED test.

NOTE: This fall, McKinley is moving to Comstock Elementary School, 801 E. Maumee St., now the Adrian Community Education Center.




L isa Fisher is already a familiar face at Adrian Public Schools, but will step into a new role this fall.

PBIS Spotlight: Springbrook Middle School

Maple PRIDE — Productivity, Respect, Integrity, Determination and Excellence - was contagious at Springbrook Middle School last school year, serving as a model for students in all APS buildings.

Springbrook was a standout following last school year's launch of the Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program, a districtwide positive behavior and discipline initiative. Through PBIS, students learn how to demonstrate the five PRIDE qualities in the classroom and beyond.

Since the program launched in January, the number of Springbrook students sent to the office has declined by 28 percent. Suspensions have declined by 62 percent at the school.

Springbrook students worked in groups to learn key Maple PRIDE behaviors, then created videos demonstrating Maple PRIDE, Principal **Nate Parker** explained. Students were rewarded with "Maple Bucks" that could be redeemed at lunchtime for rewards, prizes and special school privileges. The more Maple Bucks earned, the larger the prize awarded. T-shirt drawings were held every Friday.

"This positive recognition created a buzz in the building that resulted in students being more cognizant of the posted rules and expectations," Principal Parker explained. "This awareness led to an increase in the preferred behaviors."

PLTW courses include Introduction to Engineering Design, Automation and Robotics, and Computer Science. Through these courses, students build robots, configure rockets, create computer applications and even design bridges!

Starting this fall, Springbrook students will take the courses in the two new Springbrook Project Lead the Way Labs.

Maple Stadium kick-off!

The new and improved Maple Stadium will be dedicated during the first Varsity Football home game on Friday, Sept. 8! Kick-off is at 7 p.m.

The first 1,000 people to enter the gates will receive a Maple Stadium dedication sticker!

> Space for overflow parking will be available along Dawes Street and at the Human Services Building off Winter Street. All Maple fans will enter the stadium through the new ticket booths at the south end of the field.

Work at Maple Stadium will continue next spring with bleachers, press box upgrades and additional landscaping.

One moment in time...

H istorical artifacts — some nearly 100 years old — were discovered in "time capsules" at Garfield School and McKinley Education Center this summer.

The Garfield and McKinley time capsules were opened during two separate events as both schools prepared to close their doors. Crowds of more than 75 APS students, staff, parents, alumni and community members attended the events, shared fond memories and took final tours of the buildings.

Laughs and tears alike were shared as the capsules were opened.

Each building had a time capsule capped decades ago in its cornerstone. The relics included school records, newspapers and yearbooks from 1926! The McKinley time capsule artifacts were donated to the Lenawee County Historical society. The Garfield relics didn't fare as well due to water damage.

McKinley is slated to be torn down this fall and returned to green space. A plan to redevelop the Garfield building is underway with Keller Development.







Dual enrollment update

A drian High School will see an increase in college course enrollment this school year, another example of APS preparing all students for college and careers!

This fall, 50 students will take classes at Siena Heights University, Adrian College, Washtenaw Community College and Jackson College. These students will earn a total 158 college credits this fall semester alone.

The college courses range from algebra to psychology, and music theory to criminal justice. To enroll in the college courses, students must have at least a 3.0 GPA and a qualifying composite score on at least one student assessment test. APS pays tuition costs and related fees.


