Using bond funds, new gyms have been built at Springbrook Middle School and Adrian High School, and Maple Stadium has been updated and maintained. We strengthened our commitment to the arts with the construction of the George and Julianne Argyros Performing Arts Center and state of the art music classrooms for students.

Cutting edge STEM labs at Springbrook Middle School and Adrian High School, and instructional technology infrastructure at the elementary buildings, give APS students an experience that will launch them on their path to post-secondary success. AHS swim team sees success in part due to partnership with Recreation Department

The Adrian High School Girls and Boys Varsity Swim Teams turned in record-setting performances throughout their seasons. The girls team placed 4th overall in the state, thanks to the incredible performance of their state champion-winning 400-meter freestyle relay of Eleanora Andre, Ella Salenbien, Emily Hess and Francesca Scarabottolo and two swimmers who finished in the top 5 in the 50-meter freestyle. Similarly, the Boys team had notable achievements and success during their winter season, with several top 10 finishes and multiple state records broken. The boys also finished 4th in the state, propelled by individual state champion London Rising in the 200-meter freestyle.

Athletic Director Chad O'Brien noted that the success of the swim program is no coincidence. "The close alignment of the youth swimming program with the Varsity Program is intentional and planned." The Adrian Public School District's "Athletic Game Plan" has, as one of its main goals the alignment of youth recreation programs with its 26 varsity sports. "The swim programs and coaches have embraced the recreation feeder system and we're starting to see the results of this partnership."

The success of the youth programs is evident not just in increased participation across all of the AHS programs, but also in the success of those programs. APS Coordinator of Recreation and Strength Development Toby Ernst stated, "As we work together and build aligned programs, we will continue to see positive results in all programs."



Elementary students compete in District-wide spelling bee

Students from Alexander, Lincoln, Michener and Prairie Elementary schools competed in a District-wide spelling bee for a chance to move on to represent Adrian Public Schools at the Lenawee County Spelling bee.

Students in third, fourth and fifth grade first participated in a school-wide spelling bee within their buildings to earn the trip to the district spelling bee. The top two spellers from each grade from each building came together in late January to compete to represent Adrian Public Schools at the Lenawee County spelling bee. Only the top speller from each grade moved on, with the runner up being an alternate.

The third grade winner was John Dillard from Michener with runner up Lorelai Knorr from Prairie. The fourth grade winner was Aubrie Guerra from Prairie with runner up Oliver Baker from Lincoln. The fifth grade winner was Liam Plato from Alexander with runner up Alexis Richards from Alexander.

Academic competitions for elementary school students

Students at Alexander, Michener, Lincoln and Prairie had opportunities to participate in many academic after school programs this year. Two of those programs were the Math Pentathlon and the Science Olympiad.

Math Pentathlon is for second and third grade students. These students met after school for several months. During practices, they played games and strengthened math facts. On March 13, all four elementary schools met together for their first competition.



Science Olympiad is offered for students in grades 3-5. All four elementary schools sent teams to the Tri-County Science Olympiad competition at Siena Heights on March 7. Teams from 14 area schools showed up to compete. Students competed in events such as; STEM Build, Ping Pong Propulsion and Describe It, Do It.

The third grade team from Alexander Elementary School earned first place overall, while the third grade team from Lincoln Elementary School placed third overall. Lincoln's fourth grade team placed 7th overall. The fifth grade team from Michener Elementary School brought home the Sportsmanship Award. Many APS students earned ribbons in their categories.

Approximately 20 students attended the meetings held after school on Tuesdays and Thursdays for five weeks. Mrs. Wallich, Miss Roesch and Mrs. Fischer were thrilled to see such excitement about this new offering. During our time together, students have learned about our solar system, constellations, and even made paper mache planets and models of their favorite constellations out of pretzels and marshmallows! The students have been so excited to expand their horizons and learn more about what is beyond our own atmosphere. When the weather cooperates, we will also have a night viewing of the sky with our telescope.

In addition to our Astronomy Club, our fourth and fifth graders will be traveling to PlaneWave here in Adrian to learn how telescopes are made! We are so excited to partner with the wonderful people at PlaneWave to allow our students to see first hand all of the processes involved in manufacturing telescopes. Mrs. Wallich and Miss Roesch were able to attend an "educators' day" at PlaneWave this past summer and wanted to bring that learning to our students. It will be an exciting opportunity to visit a company that works with NASA and is located right here in Adrian.







Alexander A-Team takes on responsibilities around the school

There is a program at Alexander Elementary that empowers the students to be active and helpful in the building on a daily basis. It is called the A-Team. Approximately 45 of our fifth grade students have volunteered to help and assist in a variety of ways at Alexander to make everyday a better day. We have jobs that range from putting up and taking down our flag to assisting kindergarten teachers at the end of the day with the students and dismissal. The A-Team also assists as helpers in the office at the end of the day, as well as standing and welcoming our students every morning as they enter the building. The students rotate jobs that last for two weeks at a time, and then get another job somewhere down the line to help in another area. This is a great program to help students foster their skills in the area of responsibility, empathy for others and it allows them to grow and mature into a wellrounded young adult before leaving for middle school.

Prairie uses gardening to have students teach students

t has been a very special time this school year at Prairie! We have started an outdoor classroom and currently it includes six raised vegetable garden boxes and a chicken house that is home to five hens. We have plans to add a green house and native perennial flowering plants that will attract butterflies and other pollinators to help our vegetable garden. We want to provide more hands-on learning activities here at Prairie and doing this through a school garden is our first step towards using an outdoor classroom concept to accomplish this!

We grasped onto the idea of students teaching students to help get our entire student body involved. This has helped us begin the work of planting our school garden. We came up with a format to help figure out how to structure the cross-grade garden program. It's simple, big kids read and share information to the little kids through fictional and non fictional text before doing something in the garden. Next, we work together in the garden before going back in and writing about it together. We also spend time taking care of the hens! With their teachers, students read and studied and learned about how to raise hens.

Whether it's in the garden, or taking care of the chickens or reading together, we see a sense of purpose and empowerment growing and we see the little ones seeking out their friends throughout the day. The excitement fuels the student body resulting in successful, and at times, overwhelming results. This year the Ambassadors chose to complete one service project a month. The sky's the limit for Springbrook students

A select group of eighth grade students have been flexing their scientific muscles in a class that lets them dive deeper into content and get involved in many different extra curricular activities centered around science. Mrs. Truax teaches the course and is already impressed by the work students have put into it this year. She says, "It's a great fit for students who enjoy learning science and are looking for an extra challenge, moving at a quicker pace than traditional science classes."

Students are participating in the first You Be the Chemist Regional Challenge in Lenawee County. Several chemical companies in southeast Michigan, along with the organization Lenawee Now, are collaborating to host this challenge in our area. Students have been studying chemistry and competed against other's teams in a quiz-bowl type event in early March. They are also creating a video that addresses a real world problem by using chemistry to form a solution. Some of the chemistry problems that groups are addressing for their YBTC video include making deodorant that's natural and cruelty free, properly and effectively transporting nuclear waste, designing a sports drink that helps prevent cramps and dehydration and even preventing black ice on roads. These types of ideas are very theoretical which allows students to be creative in offering solutions to some very real problems that are not easily solved by chemistry. Their performance at



the Regional Challenge event and their success on their video submissions will be factored into the state and national You Be the Chemist Challenge.

Four students from the class recently attended the Go for Launch event hosted at the LISD Tech Center. At the event they were "Developing Teamwork, Communication & Leadership Through Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM)." Students were super excited to have the privilege of meeting a NASA astronaut Don Thomas and work with him and other space professionals to compete to have their ideas launched to the International Space Station! They worked as a team to develop a project on how Tiger Moths can adapt in space conditions. Our Springbrook Middle School team's project and mission patch design won this regional event, beating other student groups composed of 8-12th grade students from other Southeast Michigan schools. Their project is now being sent to a board to be judged against projects from other events, and if they win, it will be launched into space.

With this type of success already being accomplished by our talented students, we can certainly expect great things in the future. After all, the sky's the limit!
